
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California's senior population is growing and changing


- Projected to grow by 4 million people by 2030
- Will be more racially and ethnically diverse
- More than one million will require some assistance with daily activities
 - Only 10% of this group will require nursing home care
- Large increases likely in the number of seniors needing support to age in place, at home

This population will nearly double by 2030 . . .





More will be divorced/separated or have never married



These changes point to new and different needs


- Racial and ethnic diversity creates a need for culturally competent care
- Seniors living alone are more likely to require assistance with daily life
 - Never married adults less likely to have children, so may have fewer care resources
- Nursing home usage has fallen across age groups since 1990
 - Greater preference among providers and patients for aging in place

The number of seniors facing difficulties with self care will almost double

How can California prepare to support our seniors?

- There will be a greater need for services and workers to support seniors at home
- Medi-Cal is a major payer for nursing homes, as well as home and community-based services
- The In-Home Supportive services program can supplement the workforce and address the need for cultural competency
- Educational institutions will play an important role in training health care workers
