





### HISTORICALLY LOW REVENUES

General Fund

 Except for 2008-09, 2011-12 proposed General Fund revenues per \$100 of personal income is at the lowest level since 1972-73.

#### Total State Funds

Except for the recent recession years, 2011-12 proposed total revenues per \$100 of personal income is at the lowest level since 1982-83. Without the proposed tax extension, it would drop to the 1972-73 level. SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS IN BALANCING THE BUDGET

# WHAT COULD THE LACK OF A TAX EXTENSION MEAN FOR PUBLIC SAFETY?


- Non-partisan Legislative Analyst's Office suggested \$2.6 billion in additional cuts to the courts and criminal justice. This equates to:
  - Closing 2 prisons and housing 8,000 less inmates,
  - Eliminating state funding for local law enforcement,
  - Shifting all the state's juvenile offenders to the local level,
  - Eliminating almost all state supervision of parolees, and
  - Closing the courts one day each week.

### INLAND EMPIRE RECEIVES SUBSTANTIAL AMOUNT FROM STATE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY

- Riverside and San Bernardino Counties expected to receive about \$23 million each in 2011-12 for various local public safety programs, including:
  - Citizens Option for Public Safety (augmentations to local public safety spending).
  - Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act grants.
  - "Booking fees"
  - Grants for juvenile probation departments.
  - Funds to combat methamphetamine production.
  - Funds to support "vertical prosecution" teams.

# WHAT COULD THE LACK OF A TAX EXTENSION MEAN FOR K-12 EDUCATION?

- Legislative Analyst's Office suggested \$4.5 billion in additional cuts to K-12 education. This equates to:
  - Laying off 51,000 teachers, raising the average class size from 25 to 30 students, or
  - Eliminating 4 weeks of the school year, or cutting school administration by 46%.
- In the Inland Empire:
  - There are about 900,000 K-12 students.
  - Based on LAO figures, "all-cuts" approach would probably drop per pupil spending in Inland Empire by at least \$570 per student, which equates to about \$245 million less for Riverside County schools and about \$240 million less for San Bernardino County schools.

# WHAT COULD THE LACK OF A TAX EXTENSION MEAN FOR HIGHER EDUCATION?

- Legislative Analyst's Office suggested \$847 million in additional cuts to the universities. This equates to:
  - Eliminating about 3 UC and 3 CSU campuses, or
  - Not serving 100,000 full-time students.
  - In the Inland Empire: There are about 58,000 students at 1 UC campus and 2 CSU campuses.
- In addition, LAO suggested \$685 million in additional cuts to community colleges. This equates to:
  - Eliminating 52,000 courses, or
  - Raising student fees from \$36/unit to \$125/unit.
  - In the Inland Empire: There are about 125,000 students in 9 CC districts.

#### SOME KEY FACTS ABOUT THE INLAND EMPIRE

- 4.2 million people:
  - Riverside County: 2.24 million (5.7% of state's population).
  - San Bernardino County: 2.18 million (5.6% of state's population).
- High growth in population expected to continue: By 2020, Riverside expected to grow to 2.9 million; San Bernardino expected to grow to 2.6 million.
- Huge share of California's total geography: More than 27,000 square miles. San Bernardino is largest county; Riverside is 4<sup>th</sup> largest.
- Unemployment rates in both counties are higher than statewide rate: Statewide: 12.3%; Riverside: 14.1%; San Bernardino: 13.7%.
