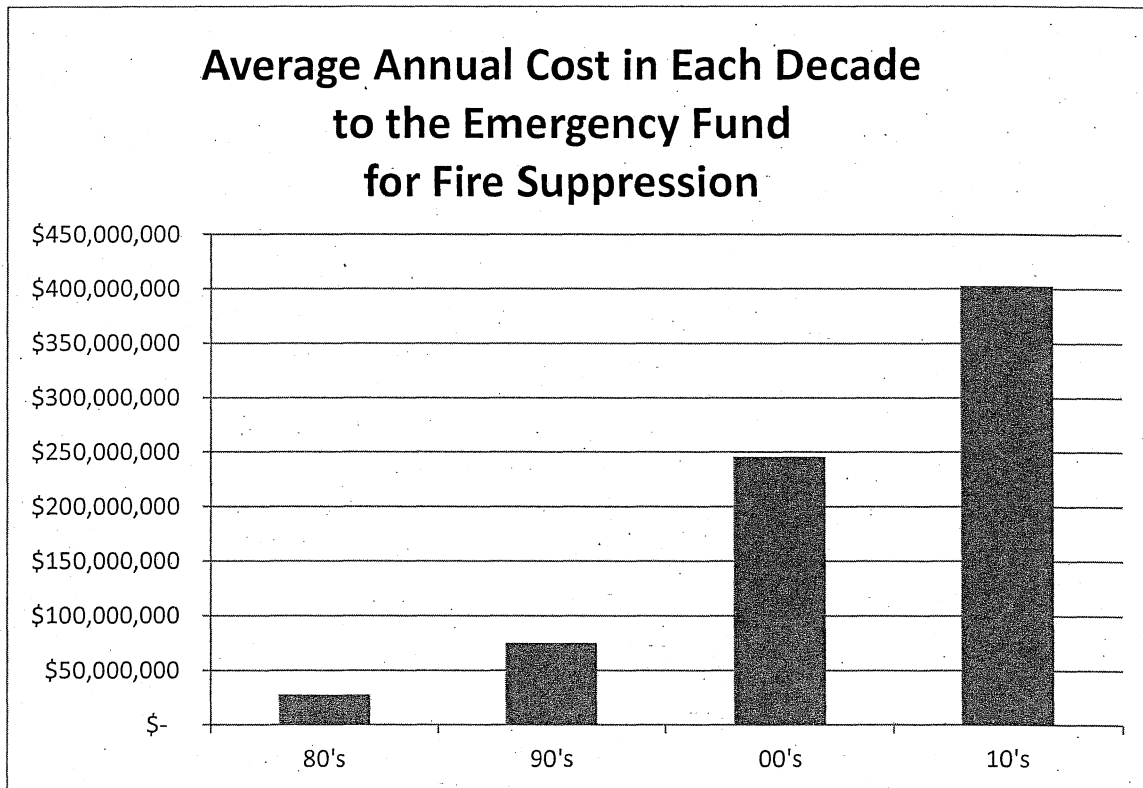


# CALFIRE: EMERGENCY FUND FIRE SUPPRESSION EXPENDITURES
