#### **SENATE**

- The Assembly provided \$4 million (GF)
   to support four judgeships in the Corona Courthouse in Riverside County.
  - The Senate provided \$1.2 million (GF) to support a new appellate court justice and accompanying staff in the second division of the Fourth District Court of Appeal in the Riverside/San Bernardino area.

#### **ASSEMBLY**

### **ISSUE 3: OFFICER INVOLVED SHOOTING INVESTIGATION TEAM**

#### **Department of Justice**

#### ASSEMBLY SENATE

- The Assembly provided \$9.7 million in

   2018-19 and \$8.7 million (GF) ongoing to create an independent review unit in the Department of Justice and adopted placeholder trailer bill language.
  - The funding will establish three teams of a total of 37 positions located in three regions of the state. The teams will investigate law enforcement officer involved shootings at the request from a local law enforcement agency or a district attorney office.

#### **ISSUE 4: SEXUAL ASSAULT KITS**

#### **Department of Justice**

#### **ASSEMBLY**

- The Assembly provided a one-time allocation of \$1 million (GF) to the
  Department of Justice to support
  activities related to the disposition of
  sexual assault kits and adopted budget
  bill language.
  - Specifically, the funding will support a statewide audit of untested sexual assault kits.

#### SENATE

- The Senate provided a one-time allocation of \$6.5 million (GF) to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for the purposes of reducing the statewide backlog of sexual assault kits and adopted placeholder budget bill language that does the following:
  - Prioritizes grants to counties and cities to eliminate existing backlogs of unprocessed evidence. All grantees are required to provide a dollar for dollar match to any state grant award.
  - Requires DOJ to provide a report to the Legislature on the cities and counties that received grants, the amount awarded, and the amount of evidence processed.

#### **ISSUE 5: JANITORIAL SERVICES**

#### **California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation**

#### **ASSEMBLY**

- The Assembly rejected the proposal and adopted placeholder trailer bill
- The trailer bill language requires CDCR to create a plan to provide supportive services to assist developmentally disabled PRIDE employees in transitioning into civil service positions if they so desire.

#### **SENATE**

The Senate rejected the proposal and adopted budget bill language to conduct a feasibility focusing on the transition and its impact on developmentally disabled individuals.

**GOVERNOR:** The Governor provided \$8.2 million in 2018-19 and \$3.6 million in 2019-20 and ongoing to the California Department of Corrections to fully transition the current PRIDE Industries contracted janitorial positions into civil service positions.

- Rejected the Governor's proposal and instead adopted \$10 million one-time in General Fund for citrus pest prevention activities.
- Adopted \$5 million one-time in General Fund and provisional language for activities related to curing or suppressing diseases associated with Shot-Hole Borer.

**GOVERNOR:** Included \$5 million (\$2.5 million in General Fund and \$2.5 million in Ag Fund) to enhance Asian Citrus Psyllid and Huanglongbing suppression activities.

### **Department of Water Resources**

#### SENATE ASSEMBLY

Approved BCP and included budget bill • Approved as proposed. language to earmark \$10 million onetime for levee repairs in Reclamation District 800.

GOVERNOR: Included \$195 million in General Fund for 2018-19 for flood risk-reduction projects. Specifically, \$170 million one-time in General Fund to support the state costshare of critical United States Army Corps of Engineers urban flood risk reduction projects; and \$25 million in General Fund ongoing to support operations, maintenance, repair, rehabilitation, and replacement of the flood control infrastructure.

- Approved \$1.5 million one-time in General Fund for local enforcement; and
- Adopt provisional language requiring CDFA to provide a report to Legislature regarding future funding needs.

**GOVERNOR:** Included \$1.853 million in General Fund to develop a Bee Safe program. Specifically:

- \$1.5 million for CDFA to contract with counties to enforce existing laws on hive registration and other laws intended to prevent apiary thefts.
- \$353,000 for CDFA to provide outreach and education to counties and stakeholders regarding best management practices, as well as pesticides and the safe movement of colonies.

GOVERNOR: \$30 million General Fund for Agricultural Energy Efficiency Projects.

#### **ISSUE 18: AB 195 SUSPENSION**

- policy process and not to affect near-term elections.
- AB 195 requires changes to the ballot label for local bonds to include in the statement of the measure to be voted on the amount of money to be raised annually and the rate and duration of the tax to be levied, instead of making such a requirement applicable only to local initiative measures.

### ISSUE 19: LANGUAGE FOR COUNTY VOTING SYSTEMS REPLACEMENT FUNDING

- No action.

- Proposed TBL codifies \$1:\$1 match for \$134.4 million General Fund.
- Allows counties that have already purchased new systems since April 2015 to receive reimbursement.
- Specifies reimbursable replacement activities include:
  - the lease or purchase of voting systems and related equipment;
  - research and development of a new voting system; and
  - manufacture of the minimum number of voting system units necessary for testing.

### **ISSUE 20: VETERANS RESOURCE CENTERS**

#### **California Community Colleges**

#### **ASSEMBLY**

Provided \$15 million one-time Proposition 98 General Fund to 2017 continue program began in Budget Act. Program allows colleges to apply for funding to establish, expand or improve veterans resource centers, which are intended to provide academic support and counseling to students who are veterans, a meeting space, and assistance to veterans seeking federal benefits..

This is a competitive grant program which requires colleges to submit information on veterans needs, how funding will be used to operate a center that meets best practice standards for veterans centers, and a long-term plan to track veterans' academic outcomes and ensure that the center is sustainable after grant funding ends.

## **ISSUE 21: RE-ENTRY/INMATE EDUCATION**

### California Community Colleges

- \$5 Provided million one-time Proposition 98 General Fund to provide grants to community colleges formerly provide support for incarcerated students and face-to-face community instruction to college students in custody. The Board of Governors would allocate grants to community colleges on a competitive basis.
- Funding would support activities such as counseling, tutoring, and instruction. The Chancellor's Office would report to the Legislature on use of these funds and outcomes associated with the funding.

Adopted placeholder trailer bill language allowing the higher per-student amount if the institutions admit more community college transfer students or offer institutional aid to Cal Grant recipients.
  - Restored the maximum Cal Grant award for students attending WASC-accredited for-profit institutions from \$8,056 annually to \$9,084.

**GOVERNOR:** The Governor's Budget allows a statutory cut to the maximum Cal Grant award for students attending WASC-accredited for-profit institutions from \$9,084 annually to \$8,056. This action reduces Cal Grant costs by about \$550,000.

#### **ISSUE 23: UC RESEARCH**

#### **University of California**

- Provided one-time funding to create or expand research programs:
- \$7.5 million for opioid research. State funding would allow research into nonopioid pain management and the development of non-opioid pain medications. Additionally, state funding could help the state access \$500 million in federal funds available for this type of research.
- \$7.5 million for sugar research. Funding would be used to conduct a study into whether sugar in liquid form causes more detrimental health effects than sugar in solid food.
- \$2 million for firearms research. Augment previous one-time funding to launch the University of California Firearm Violence Research Center. Additional funding would help the center hire temporary staff and carry out further research.

### **ISSUE 25: DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES BRIDGE PROPOSAL**

#### **ASSEMBLY**

Provided \$50 million General Fund for 2018-19 (one-time) to provide "bridge" supplemental funding rate providers, in high labor cost areas of the state, facing fiscal distress due to local minimum wage increases. \$50 million is intended to provide a rate increase for vendors who apply and qualify for a two-year period. A rate study, as required by Section 4519.8 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, is due on or before March 1, 2019. A federal match of approximately \$38 million is expected to augment the General Fund investment, providing \$88 million in total funds for this purpose if approved. Associated placeholder trailer bill language was adopted with this proposal.

This Response System supports the goals of the Continuum of Care Reform (CCR) to provide timely, in-home supports and services to help families thrive. Associated placeholder trailer bill language was adopted with this proposal.

**GOVERNOR:** Funding for FPRRS is proposed at \$27.1 million total funds (\$21.6 million General Fund) for 2018-19. Of the \$27.1 million total funds in 2018-19, \$17.5 million total funds (\$13.9 million General Fund) is for Child Welfare Services and \$9.6 million total funds (\$7.8 million General Fund) is for probation departments. The 2017-18 funding for FPRRS was \$43.3 million General Fund.

**GOVERNOR:** Earlier this year, the Department of Finance (DOF) produced a report on Board Member staffing levels. This report recommended that each Board Member retain two exempt staff and six civil service staff, for a total of eight positions, consistent with its assessment that Board Member workload has been reduced by 30 percent. DOF also recognized that BOE, CDTFA and OTA are still experiencing transitions and that it is important to allow the Administration and Legislature to revisit staffing in the future.

On the other hand, the Legislative Analyst Office (LAO) recommended that Board Member staffing be reduced even further to two exempt staff and four civil service positions, effectively cutting Board Member staff by half



The Department of Finance has suggested Budget Bill Language to strike Provision 4(a) of 8860-001-0001 which limits the number of copies DOF distributes. With this edit, DOF would ask each caucus to articulate how many copies of the Summary document rather than be limited by the language.

The May Revision assumed a waiver of the local cost share for the Northern California wildfires (estimated at \$29.1 million). At the time of developing the May Revision, the Southern California counties impacted by the December wildfires and mudslides had not yet requested a similar waiver.

The State has since received letters requesting this waiver. In working with OES, the latest estimate for the local cost share of debris removal is approximately \$5.5 million (detailed below).

Total Cost: \$219.4 million

Estimated Federal Share (90%): \$197.5 million Estimated California Share (10%): \$21.9 million

Estimated State Share of California Cost (75%): \$16.4 million Estimated Local Share of California Cost (25%): \$5.5 million

The Department of Finance notes that both estimates are still subject to considerable uncertainty as we work through the Federal reimbursement process.
