## **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this bill is to create regulations relating to lead paint removal and to set forth civil and criminal penalties for violations of regulations on the removal lead paint and the requirement that a person trained in lead paint remove be present when removal occurs.

Existing law establishes the federal Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention Act to create a prohibition against the future use of lead-based paint. (42 United States Code § 4851)

Existing law establishes the federal Residential Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction Act of 1992 (also known as Title X) to require anyone selling or leasing single-and multi-family housing units built before 1978 to disclose information about lead-based paint hazards to prospective buyers or tenants.
